2009 Greek Week Blood Drive Challenge Benefits Center and Donors



SCBC recently teamed up with Florida State University's Greek organizations to host the 2009 Greek Week Blood Drive Challenge. The event consisted of multiple on-campus blood drives throughout the week of March 30 to April 3, and was designed as an opportunity for individuals involved in the Greek system to show their support for patients within the community. During the weeklong event, we were able to meet 151 FSU donors, Greek and Non-Greek alike, each with a desire to help someone in need. In total, 139 units of blood were collected, which translates into as many as 417 lives saved.

To show their gratitude towards the students and faculty members who participated in the event, SCBC presented a 42" LG LCD HDTV to the Greek organization with the most participants. With 100% participation from their chapter, along with the contributions of friends they had brought along to drives, the brothers of Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity took home the prize.
